Remembering His Great Sacrifice

A Dark Day that brought Salvation by Bruce Woolard

On that fateful day in human history, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ was crucified on Mount Calvary outside the city of Jerusalem. For three hours there was absolute darkness that added to the gloom and sorrow of the lowest point in human depravity. Rejecting and killing the Son of God so violently was indicative of the evil that resides in the soul of man. The sun refused to give its rays of light as dark clouds gathered over Jerusalem, yet in the darkness, God was at work performing a divine act for mankind's atonement. Jesus gave His life as the Lamb of God to take away the wickedness of sin and damnation.

On this Good Friday, we call it "Good" because in the midst of disaster and tragedy, God's goodness shines through. As we break bread in remembrance of His sacrifice and drink from the vine (called new wine) as a symbol of His blood and the redemption of our body and soul.

As you partake in this significant and memorable act, read **John 19:16-22**.

"Then he delivered Him to them to be crucified. Then they took Jesus and led Him away. And He, bearing His cross, went out to a place called the Place of a Skull, which is called in Hebrew, Golgotha, where they crucified Him, and two others with Him, one on either side, and Jesus in the centre. Now Pilate wrote a title and put it on the cross. And the writing was:

JESUS OF NAZARETH, THE KING OF THE JEWS."

Then many of the Jews read this title, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, Greek, and Latin. Therefore the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but, He said, "I am the King of the Jews."

Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

Because He lives, we can face tomorrow.
